World Elder Abuse Awareness Day (WEAAD) was launched on June 15, 2006 by the International Network for the Prevention of Elder Abuse and the World Health Organization at the United Nations. We are grateful to Andre Lingham, Center for Elder Justice and Education, for his excellent presentation on this topic during our fall conference. Elder Abuse: Little Known Facts

- Most elder abuse is committed by trusted individuals, such as family members
- Financial elder abuse has resulted in losses between 3 billion and 36 billion dollars per year
- Abused elders have a 300% risk of early death when compared to those who were not abused
- Two out of three elder abuse victims are women
- Rates of abuse of older persons increased during Covid

Red Flags of Elder Abuse

- Physical Abuse: bruises, broken bones, lacerations, and reports from victim that they have been assaulted
- Emotional Abuse: becoming withdrawn, changes in sleeping or eating habits, depression or anxiety
- Financial Exploitation: changes in banking habits, changes in a will or financial documents, unpaid bills
- Neglect: poor hygiene, untreated bed sores, desertion at a hospital or other facility
- Sexual Assault: victim reports of being sexually assaulted, bruises around genital area, changes in demeaner

Preventing Elder Abuse

- Educate oneself and others about how to recognize and report elder abuse
- Listen to older adults who report alleged abuse

 Report abuse or suspected abuse to Adult Protective Services, Ombudsman, and local police

- Frequently check on older adults who have few friends or family members
- Educate and re-educate older adults on elder abuse
